Ickleford Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire Results Summary

Prepared by the Ickleford Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group - August 2021





- Aim to inform the development of the Ickleford Neighbourhood Plan
- Available online via Survey Monkey
 27th October 21st December 2020
- Hard copies were also available
- Extensively publicised via posters, banners, e-mail, Facebook and leaflet to every household

345 online responses and 10 hard copies received, a response rate of approximately 40%




Analysis and presentation

Approach

- The questionnaire built on earlier consultation work
- It consisted of open and closed questions
- Responses to open questions were coded to identify shared concepts and draw out detail
- These concepts were reviewed and merged into more general themes. Frequency was noted, but not used statistically



1. What Ickleford means to you

Thinking of all aspects of living in Ickleford, how satisfied or dissatisfied are you and your household with living in the parish?



95% or residents are very or fairly satisfied with living in the parish

- attractive accessible countryside
- location, close but separate to Hitchin
- small village feel
- sense of community
- strong central hub

Concerns


- speed and volume of traffic
- some mentioned drug use and lack of policing
- impact of development and change

"It is a small friendly village with good community ties and facilities. It gives an entirely different feel compared to living in a town or city."

Wish list

- Traffic and transport
 - parking, pedestrian safety
- Invest in environment and green spaces
- New retail
 - café/coffee shop or bakery
 - post office
 - larger shop
- New services, e.g. GP, pre-school
- Improve current facilities,
 e.g. Village Hall, Sports and Social Club, and School


"It would be nice to have a cafe, somewhere to meet that isn't a pub. There isn't anything for 11-18 year olds to meet indoors."

"We would love a post office please!"




3. Ickleford Primary School

How important to the character of the village do you think it is that the school remains in the existing location?


Expand/improve current site?

Ickleford Primary School - viewpoints

Strong opinions

- Position at heart of village considered integral to village character by many
- Building itself important
- Parking issues currently
- Encourage more walking and cycling
- Concern over safety and congestion at potential new site

If school were to move...

- Keep as a community asset
- Most do not want housing
- Shops, café, pre-school/nursery, health centre and recreation?

"it would be such a shame to see Ickleford school close. It is in the heart and history of Ickleford. I cannot think of a better use for the site."

"The school should NOT move. It is an important historical site. Any child attending the school senses its history and family/village feel. At the very least it should remain as an Infant school."

"The Vehicular Access to the existing School is very poor and not suitable for more use than it has at present."


"More needs to be done to encourage parents to park at the sports and social club, and to encourage children and their parents to walk and cycle to school."



4. Housing Development

New housing

- New development in the Parish and surrounding area is a source of concern for many residents
- The emerging Local Plan allocates sites for big increases in housing for the Parish
- Potential new development in the village itself includes:
 - IC1 (Duncots Close)
 - IC2 (Burford Grange area)
 - IC3 (Bedford Road)
 - possible development of the Ickleford Mill brownfield site.

Housing Development - how much and where?

New housing – how much and where?

- 66% say restrict development beyond that in emerging Local Plan
- 45% say small infill developments may be appropriate
- 50% say brownfield sites should be considered
- Many want no further development at all
- Many consider some development inevitable, a few welcome it
- Housing affordability is currently an issue

"With an ageing population nationally more smaller properties/bungalows (needed) so larger family homes can be freed up "

"The style of buildings should be sympathetic to the village style"

"Empathetic, workable, infrastructure, a sustainable plan for all to enjoy the very thing that living in a village entails. Ickleford is a village not a small town."



Housing Development - concerns

Concerns

- Fear of overdevelopment
- Insufficient infrastructure
- Potential merging with Hitchin
- Damage to village identity, character and community
- Negative effects on environment






Housing Development - accommodation types

60%

What type of accommodation do you think will be needed in the parish in next 10 years?



NB respondents reported higher house ownership levels than found in 2011 census

The need for affordable housing may therefore be even greater than these findings suggest.




Housing Development - requirements

Development should be...

Well controlled (maintain village integrity and identity)

Affordable for local younger residents, families and downsizers




Built to a high standard and use green technologies and sustainable environment resources

Made with sufficient resident and visitor parking



5. Environment and Heritage

How important is it to you to that Ickleford village maintains a separate identity from neighbouring villages and towns?



Additionally:

- 88% consider it very important to minimise impact on historic buildings and conservation area
- 90% consider it very important to minimise impact on trees, hedges, verges, footpaths, bridleways, rivers, ponds and wildlife



Environment and heritage - insights

- Natural environment intrinsic to Ickleford's identity (footpaths, rivers, common land)
- COVID-19 lockdowns have increased appreciation of open spaces
- Path maintenance important. Better signage, information boards, more benches and bins?
- Potential conflict of use between walkers and cyclists. New cycle paths?
- Improve car parking? Good/bad?
- Dangers Cadwell Bridge and Bedford Road crossings

"The countryside walks all around the edge of the village are beautiful, I can't pick a favourite & I'd be sad to see any of the fields built on."

"All the footpaths and bridleways around Ickleford are used by our family for walking, running, cycling, picnics.


"Ickleford Common and its beautiful views and its wildlife is a true gem."

"Would be great if additional walks could be opened up along the river or to surrounding villages. Also cycle paths that would allow safe access to the greenway and other cycle routes. safe cycle route (as much off road as possible) linking Hitchin and Stevenage."

Footpaths and bridlepaths throughout the parish are important to residents



Should any of the following activities be encouraged in the parish of Ickleford?




Suggestions

- Flexible office and workshop space (with good communications)
- Local enterprise subsidy
- Better public transport
- More shops/post office
- Café/bakery
- Community events
- Promotion of local skills and services
- Address traffic issues (including safe cycle routes to local towns)



7. Transport



- Higher car ownership levels than 2011 census
- Underrepresentation of certain households?
- Implications for public transport?

- 98% use car at least once a week and 64% use every day
- 75% walked every day
- 64% rarely or never use the bus. Only 5% travel by bus once a week or more
- 11% cycle daily, 26% weekly
- 9% use train every day, 11% once a week and 13% once a month*
 - * The survey was conducted during the November 2020 Covid lockdown which may have influenced the public transport response



Transport - safety concerns

Are you concerned about any of the following?

287 answered

(31% consider it a minor safety issue)

"The Turnpike Lane roundabout is an accident waiting to happen."

"We are very concerned about access to the lavender farm under Cadwell bridge as we live a 5 minute walk away and simply don't want to risk our lives walking there!"





Transport - further traffic comments

Concerns around roads and traffic was a major issue across the whole survey

Link made between increased development and increased traffic

Requests:

- Widen narrow footpaths
- Pedestrian crossings on Bedford Road and Turnpike Lane
- Improved traffic calming, e.g. average speed cameras, 20mph
 limits and upgrading existing measures

"the humps do not calm traffic...those people who want to speed do, they do not slow those down who are speeding. We walk along the paths to school and they are narrow, with the amount of traffic and speed of traffic it can be scary."








Transport – cycling, buses and footpaths

- Traffic speed and volume a barrier to cycling, requests for new and safe cycle routes
- Buses not well used by respondents:
 - not frequent enough
 - too expensive
 - other routes required, e.g. to local train stations
- Great appreciation of rural footpaths, their upkeep is important

"... the bus service in the morning is useless for village children attending schools in Hitchin as the timings (every hour) mean that the kids would be late for school! This means parents having to drive the kids, adding to traffic, pollution and unnecessary journeys



8. About Your Household – age profile




Very similar findings to 2011 census (see table for comparison)

| Age | Census 2011 | Ickleford NP 2020 |

| 0-17 | 20% | 24% |
| 18-24 | 6% | 7% |
| 25-74 | 64% | 63% |
| +75 | 10% | 6% |



About Your Household - employment




32% working from home. This will include those who normally do so and those doing so due to COVID




8. About Your Household – occupancy and tenure

People in household



How long has someone from your household lived in the parish?



89% own their own home. This is a higher level than found in the 2011 census (see table for comparison)

| Tenure | Census 2011 | Ickleford NP 2020 |
|--|-------------|----------------------|
| Owned | 64% | 89% |
| Social rented | 24% | 5% |
| Private landlord or letting agency | 10% | 4% |
| Other/Living rent free/Prefer not to say | 2% | 2% |



9. Respondents' final comments

Echo rest of survey

- Desire to keep character of the village, maintaining its sense of community, strong village centre and separation from Hitchin
- Concerns over traffic
- Great appreciation of the village, its community and countryside
- Concerns over impact of new development
- Suggestions include: pond, communal tree planting, clearing river, village police officer, scouting field and lodge in the south east corner of Ickleford Common, and community village events

"We very much appreciate our village and particularly so during this time. We wish to see its essence retained but allow it to continue to thrive. With proper planning and consultation this should be easily achievable."

"Keeping the village's essence /character whilst also trying to future-proof it, is a delicate balancing act. However, it is important to try to keep its history and character. Far too many lovely villages have been swamped by towns such as Stevenage and Luton. Homogenisation of Ickleford into a suburb of Hitchin must be avoided at all costs."

"It's not that long ago that many of the properties in Ickleford were fields (or smaller homes than they are now) if earlier generations had complained then many families would not have the joy of living in this lovely community. I do hope that they current residents give others the opportunity of living here too."
